Most people know that Manna Café is a Christ-centered organization, so folks occasionally ask me if we share the gospel while serving people. The answer is yes; we always have and always will.

We just don't do it in the traditional way.

For example, we don't offer a typical church service. Perhaps one day we will, but since 2010, Bible teaching has happened at our five weekly community meals. Our guests have plenty of time to sit and chat when



they get their first plate. But before second helpings are available, a team leader shares the Scripture. Messages are relatively brief but powerful. Afterward, several of our core volunteers deliver hot meals to shut-ins in Summit Heights and Lincoln Homes, praying for and encouraging anyone in need.

Similarly, when the weather is frigid and our emergency warming center is open, local musicians and pastors share the gospel or music. Clothing distribution also presents an opportunity to love people in practical ways. "Sometimes folks just want to talk if they're sick or having a hard time," says longtime volunteer Cindy. "I ask if I can pray for them, and they always say yes." In addition, throughout Manna's 15-year history, there have been seasons when we've gathered in the warehouse or community center for the purpose of prayer and worship. And every Tuesday morning at 9 a.m., anyone is welcome to join me in my office for 45 minutes of prayer in a peaceful, intimate setting.

Many of our staff and volunteers do the work of the gospel after hours and behind the scenes. I lost count long ago of the times I've heard through the grapevine of someone sharing their testimony or praying with a client who was hurting, sick, or lonely. Occasionally the love of God is shared in



profound ways without anyone saying a word. Sometimes those are the most powerful moments.

Many years ago, my late husband Kenny (founder of Manna Café) felt like the Lord told him he wasn't allowed to preach to someone who was hungry without feeding him first, so that's what we've always done. No matter your age, ethnicity, race, gender, sexual preference, social status, or religious beliefs — we're going to feed you. And by the grace of God, our friends will receive both physical and spiritual nourishment. So come taste all the good that the Lord provides -- we're always serving up generous portions of something delicious, with hope and compassion on the side!
